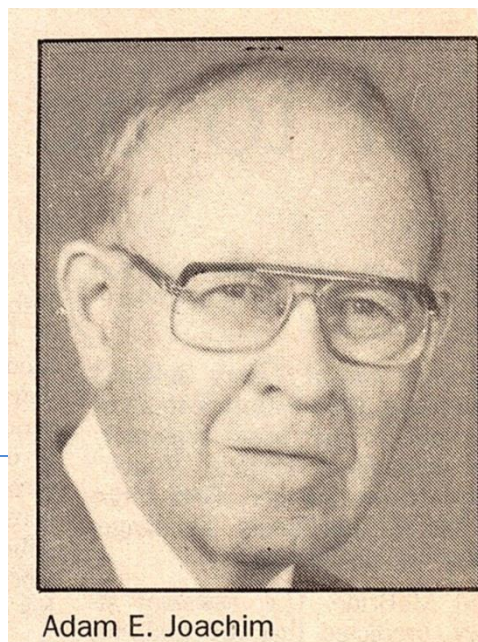

A.E. Joachim, Former Wilmot School Superintendent, Dies

Former Wilmot school superintendent Adam E. Joachim of Stratford died Aug. 31 at his home.

Funeral services were held Saturday at Faith United Methodist Church in Aberdeen with burial at the Milbank Cemetery.

Casket bearers were Robert Joachim, Richard Anderson, Clarence Dais, Earl Rott, James Janke and Mark Stange. Rev. Gideon Eberhart gave a reading. Ushers were Ed Schlauch and Ervin Betsch.

Organist was Jude Borgesen. Soloist was Gordon Ehmke, who was accompanied by Estella Merkel.

Adam Joachim was born July 17, 1905, in rural McPherson County, son of pioneer homesteaders Wilhelm and Fredericka (Isler) Joachim. He grew up on the family farm and attended rural school. He graduated from the Eureka Lutheran Academy High School and from Northern Normal and Industrial College in Aberdeen.

Mr. Joachim received his master's degree from the University of North Dakota in Grand Forks in 1938. He did post-graduate work at Northern State College in Aberdeen, McPhail School of Music in Minneapolis and Vander Cook School of Music and Ohio State University in Columbus, OH.

He married Anna S. Ulrich at Milbank on Aug. 12, 1931. She passed away on May 5, 1994.

Mr. Joachim's 40-year career in education started when he taught in a rural school, Detmold No. 2 in McPherson County. He was a teacher and principal at Hazel and Waubay. He served as superintendent of schools at Herried, Wilmot and Groton before retiring in 1967.

After retirement, Mr. Joachim served on the Stratford Town Board for 12 years and was chairman of the board for 11 years.

Mr. Joachim was a member of the South Dakota Education Association (SDEA), National Educa-

tion Association (NEA), Music Educators, Kiwanis, Kappa Delta Pi, The Hickory Stick, School Administrators Association and the Aberdeen Retired Teachers Association. He was a member of the Brown County Regional Library Board for 10 years and the Aberdeen-Brown Area-wide Planning Agency for four years. He was a member of the Faith United Methodist Church, serving as Sunday school teacher, church officer and in other capacities.

Mr. Joachim did considerable research in the Joachim genealogy. He wrote a book on the history of the Evangelical Church in South Dakota. He also authored a book on pioneer life in Detmold Township and McPherson County, entitled "Spring Creek Memories". He traveled extensively in the United States, Canada and Germany. He also spent many hours with his garden and flowers.

Survivors include many nieces and nephews. He was preceded in death by his parents, wife, three brothers and five sisters.

 - Born 18 July 1776, Zweibrucken, Germany
 - Moved to Gronau, Oberstenfeld in Wurttemberg, Germany
 - died 12 Jan 1846/1849, Friedenstal, Bessarabia (now Ukraine)
- Wife: Katharina Barbara Knorr
 - Born 18 July 1777 Hansweiler or Zweibrucken, Germany; Died Friedenstal at age 71
 - Christening: 20 July 1777, Luthersbrunn/Vinningen (Winengen), Germany (Bayern/Bavaria)

- **Four or Five Sons:** Michael (b 1816), **Georg Adam I (1819)** Johann Christian (1821/1822), Andreas (b 18XX) & possibly one son with unknown name; all born Katy, Prussia
- Wilhelm & Katharina moved to Katy/Kanty/Conti, Poland/Prussia 1800-1804
- **Georg Adam I**, Johann & Andreas migrated from Poland/Prussia to Friedenstal, Bessarabia in 1835 to 1840 (three Wilhelm sons) *according to AE Joachim genealogy documents*
- Son **Georg Adam Joachim I (known as Adam)**: born 6 Feb 1819 in Konti Poland, confirmed 1833; died 9 June 1899 Friedenstal, Bessarabia
 - Wife Christiana Katharina Schaeffer, they married 11 Nov 1841 in Friedenstal
 - Wife Katharina born 15 Dec 1819 in Hansweiler, Germany; d 1880 Friedenstal
 - Eight children – all born in Friedenstal, Bessarabia:
 - Katharina, Johann/John Jacob, **Georg Adam (II)**, Barbara, Gottlieb, Andreas, Dorothea, Wilhelm Abraham
- Son **Georg Adam II** born 23 Jun 1849, died 8 Aug 1922
 - Sons John Jacob, **Georg Adam II** & Gottlieb came to the Dakota Territory, USA in 1876 with their wives & children (*according to AE Joachim Genealogy document*). Note: Georg Adam II U.S. Passport application is dated 5 Oct 1881 & his US State Dept Visa/travel certificate is dated 18 Oct 1881
 - Georg Adam II married Dorothea Kern (b 4 Nov 1851, d 27 Feb 1941)
 - 10 children: **Christian**, Jacob, Gottlieb, Barbara, Martha, Katharina, Georg Adam III (Adam), William, Margaret, Emmanuel
- Son **Christian Joachim**: born 13 Dec 1874, died 16 Oct 1956

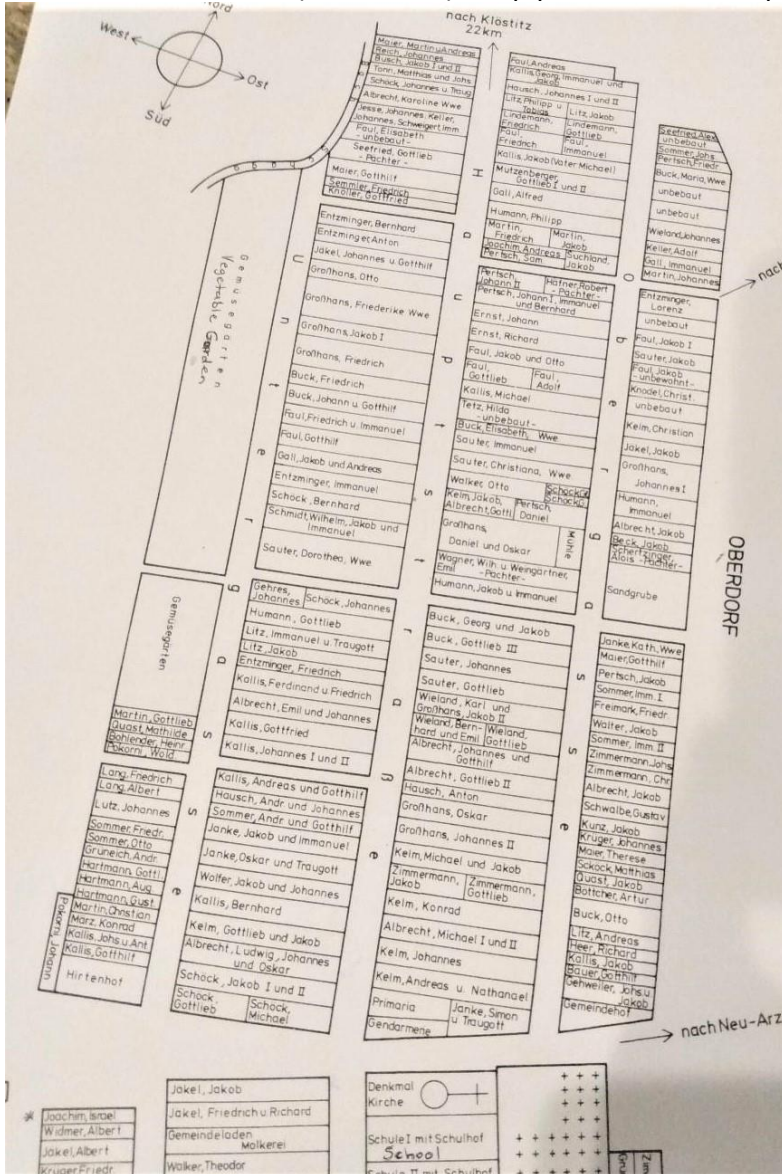

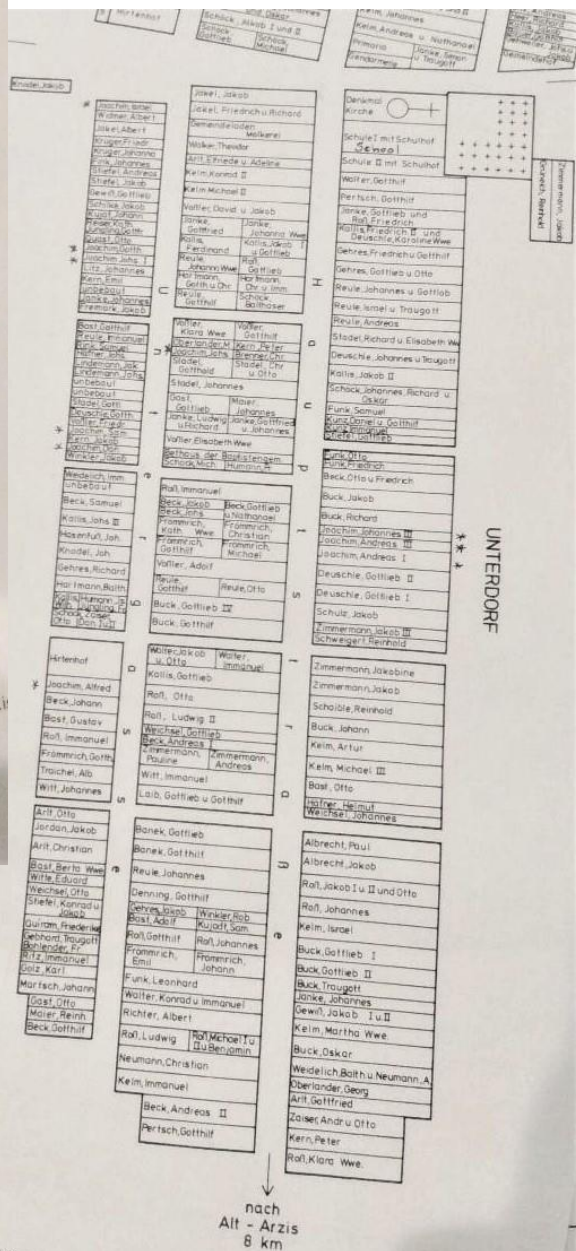
Friedenstal Village Ortsplan

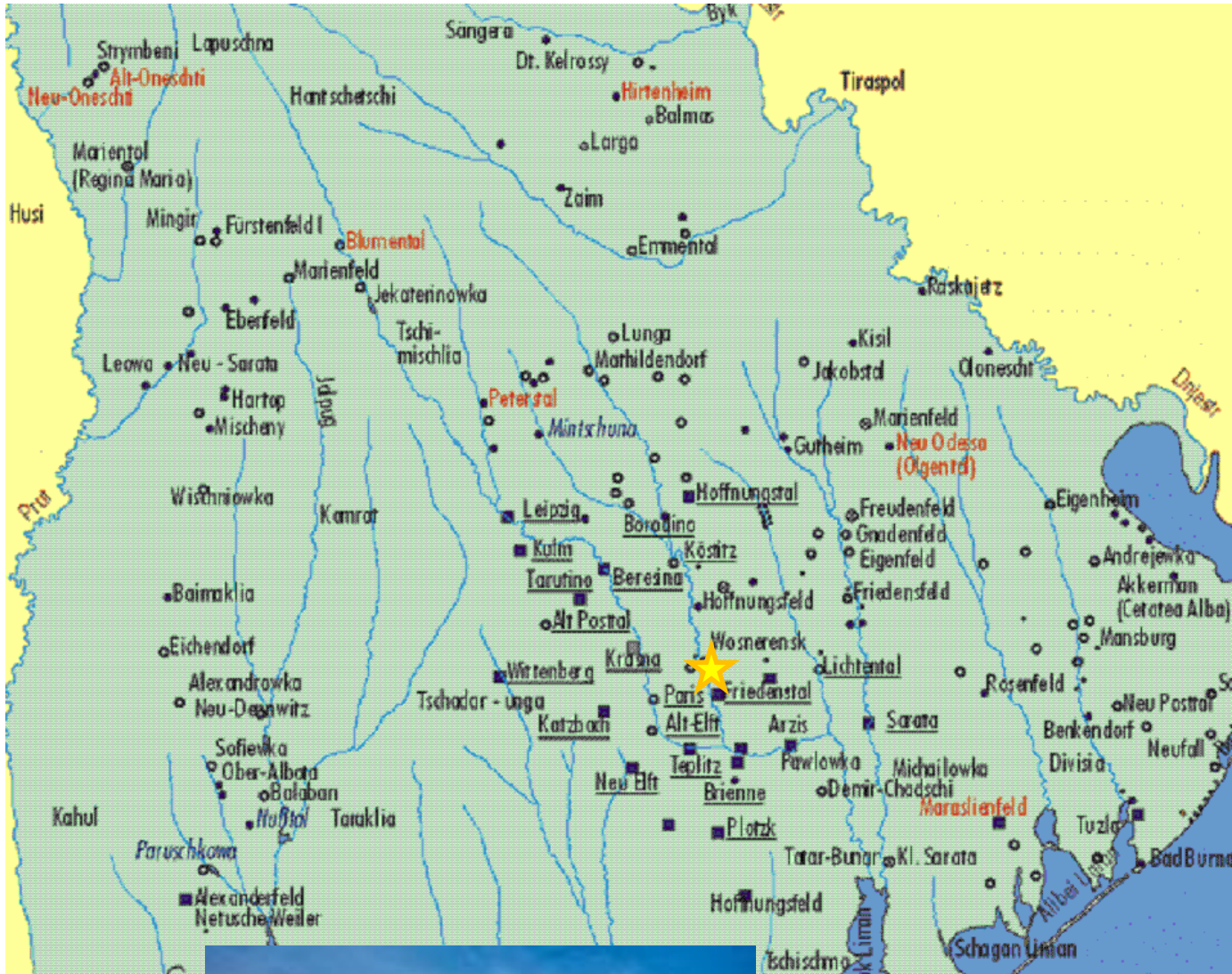

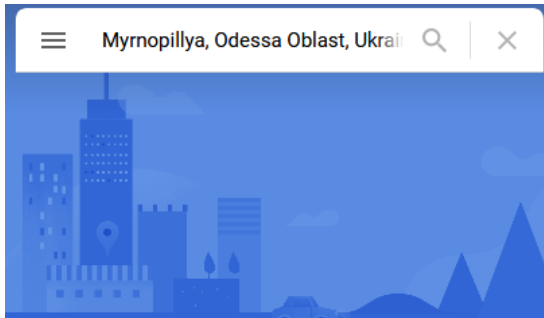
Ukraine/Moldova Map showing Former Bessarabia and Friedenstal Village

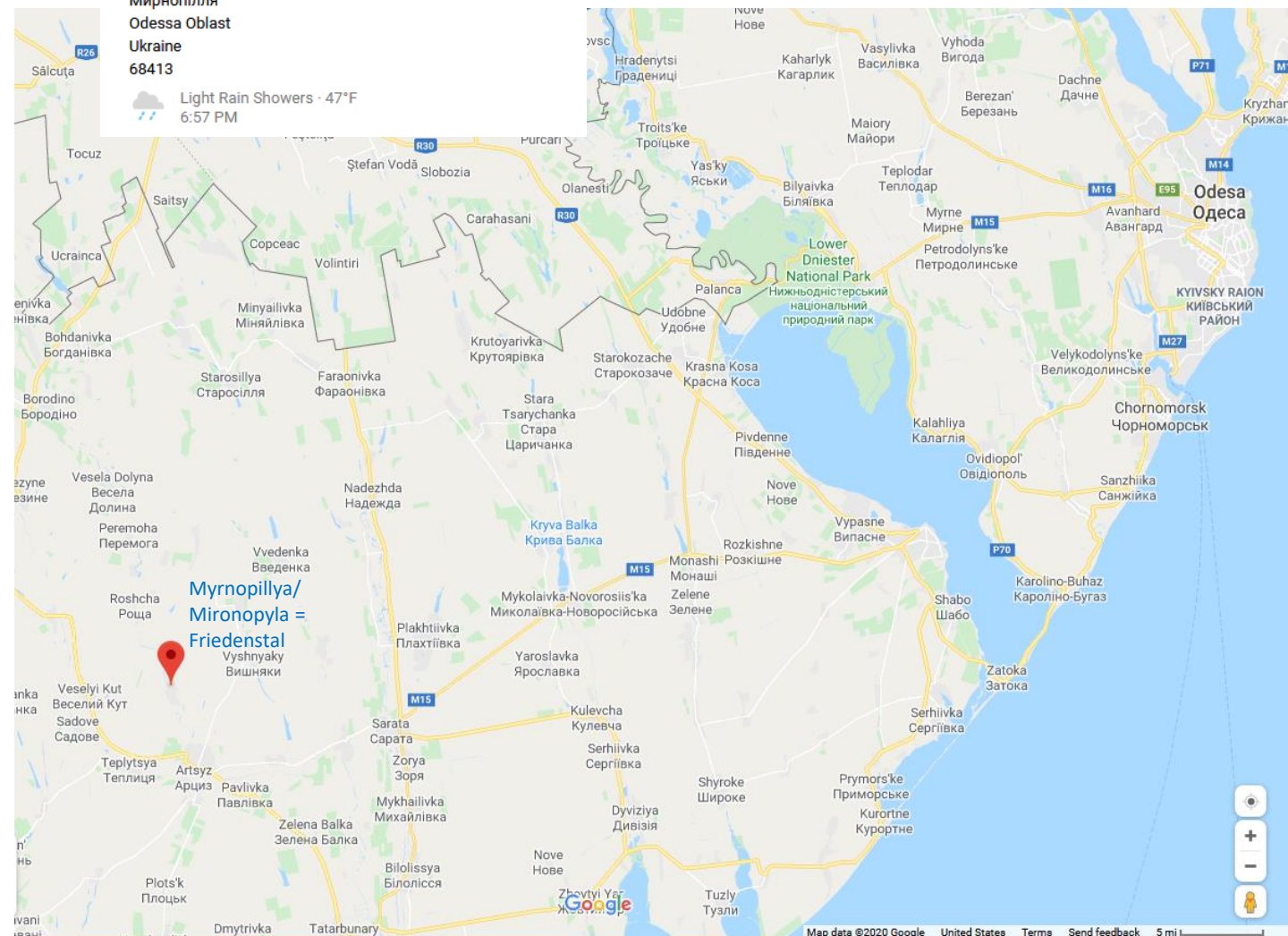
Ukraine/Moldova Map showing Former Bessarabia and Friedenstal; current village name is Myrнопилля, Odessa Region, Ukraine

Gronau, Kreis (County) Heilbronn, Baden-Württemberg (State), Germany: birthplace or place of origin of Wilhelm Adam Joachim

Local Geography: Oberstenfeld is located in the upper [Bottwar](#) river valley. It lies in the northeast of the district of Ludwigsburg. In the north it borders to the [Löwensteiner Berge](#) hills, in the west there are the hills Forstberg and Wunnenstein covered by [vineyards](#).

- **Incorporated villages:** The villages **Gronau** (located northeast of Oberstenfeld) and Prevorst (located about five kilometers northeast in the Löwensteiner Berge hills).

Gronau : When the first settlers came up the valley of the Bottwar, some chose the "green meadow", Gronau, which is located far upstream of the lively brook. Nobody knows exactly when this was, because it certainly took a long time before the "green meadow" was first mentioned in a deed of donation from the Lorsch monastery. Dragebodo and Godetanchus were the names of this area, which "Gruonowa" bequeathed to the Benedictines on the mountain road in 876. This is also the first documentary mention of a part of today's municipality of Oberstenfeld, to which Gronau belongs today. In the 13th century Gronau came from the Counts of Calw to the Margrave of Baden and around 1350 at Württemberg. The village belonged to the district of Beilstein, from 1810 to the Oberamt Marbach and from 1938 until voluntary integration into the municipality of Oberstenfeld on January 1, 1972 to the district of Heilbronn.

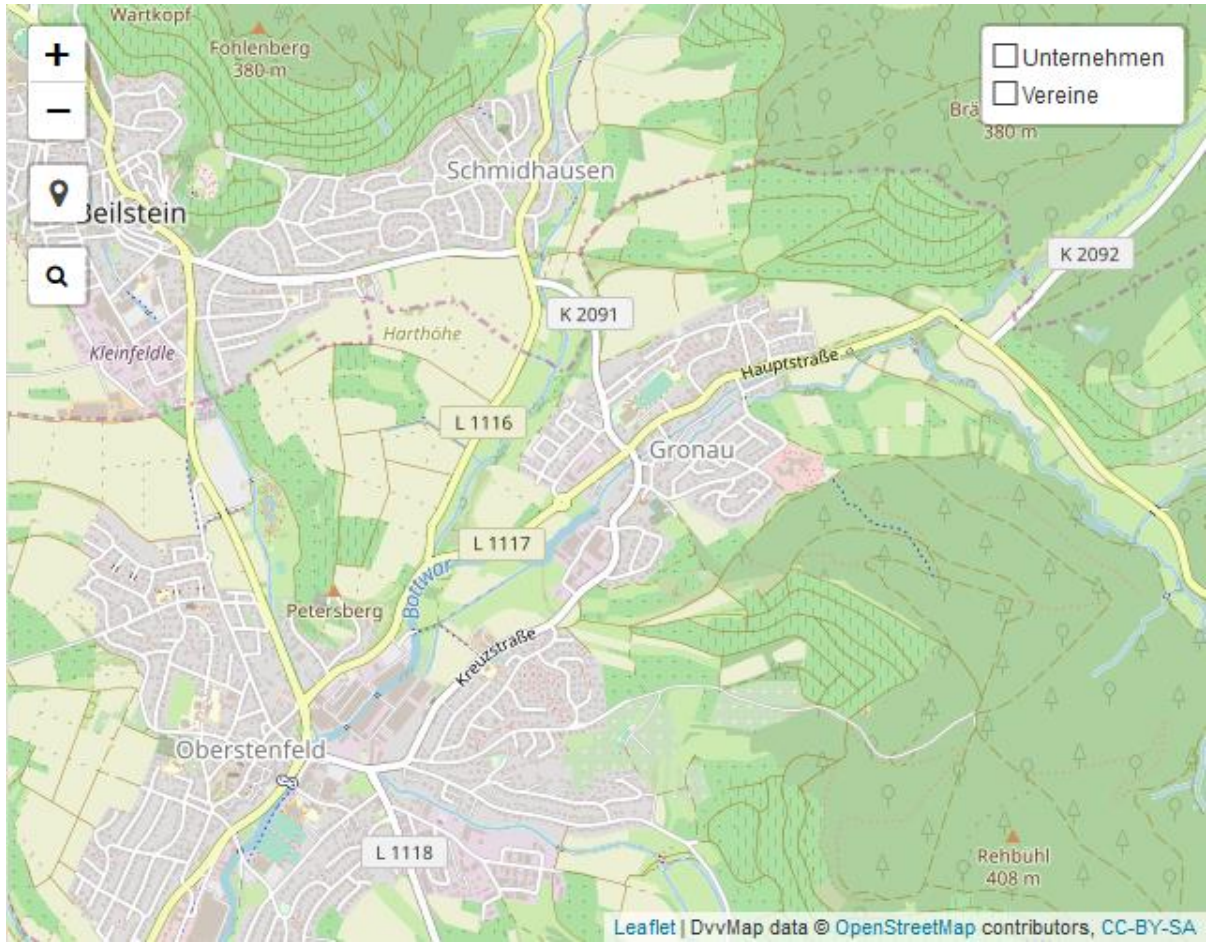
- **Gronau** is nestled in an extremely varied and charming landscape of the Löwenstein Mountains, surrounded by castles, extensive forests, lush orchards and vineyards. The Bottwar, which once flowed through the middle of the village of Gronau, originates in these shady forests. Many a house on Gronauer Hauptstraße could only be reached via a rickety footbridge. But in 1935, a thorough stream correction eliminated the constant flood risk that the young Bottwar brought to the village every year.

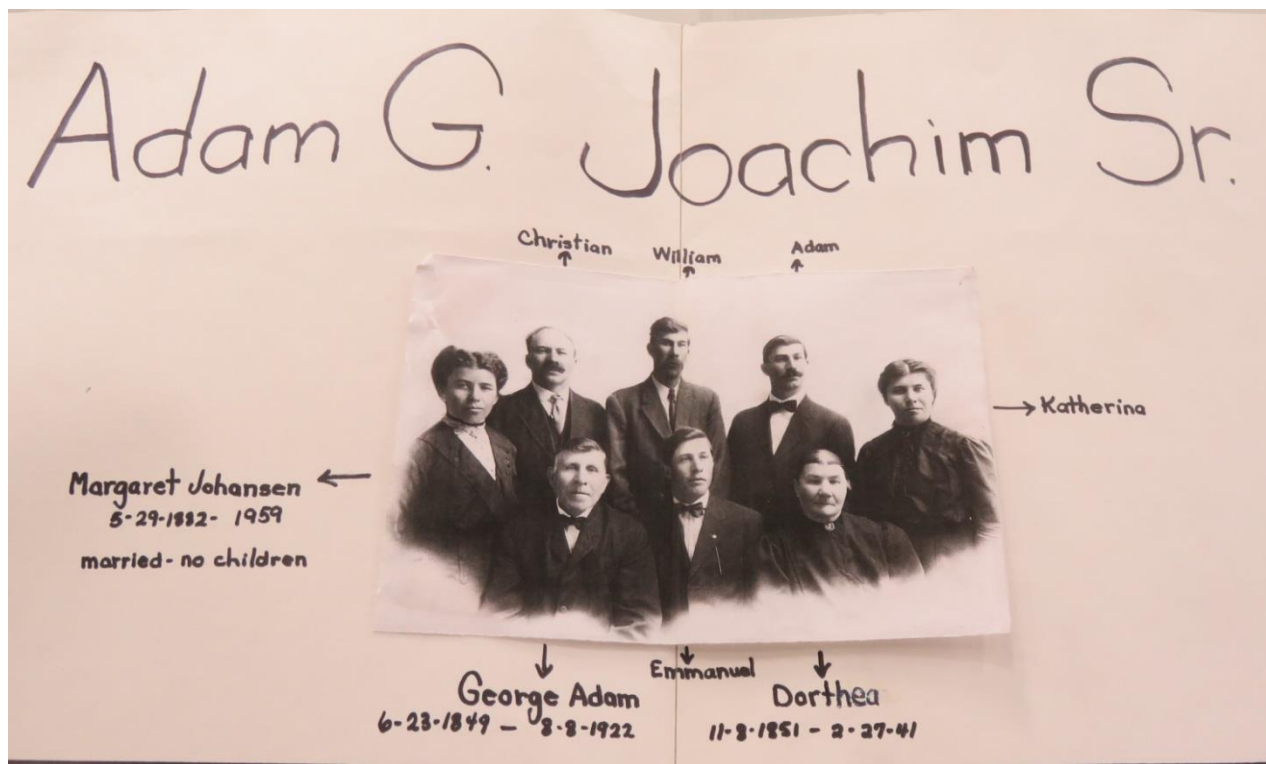



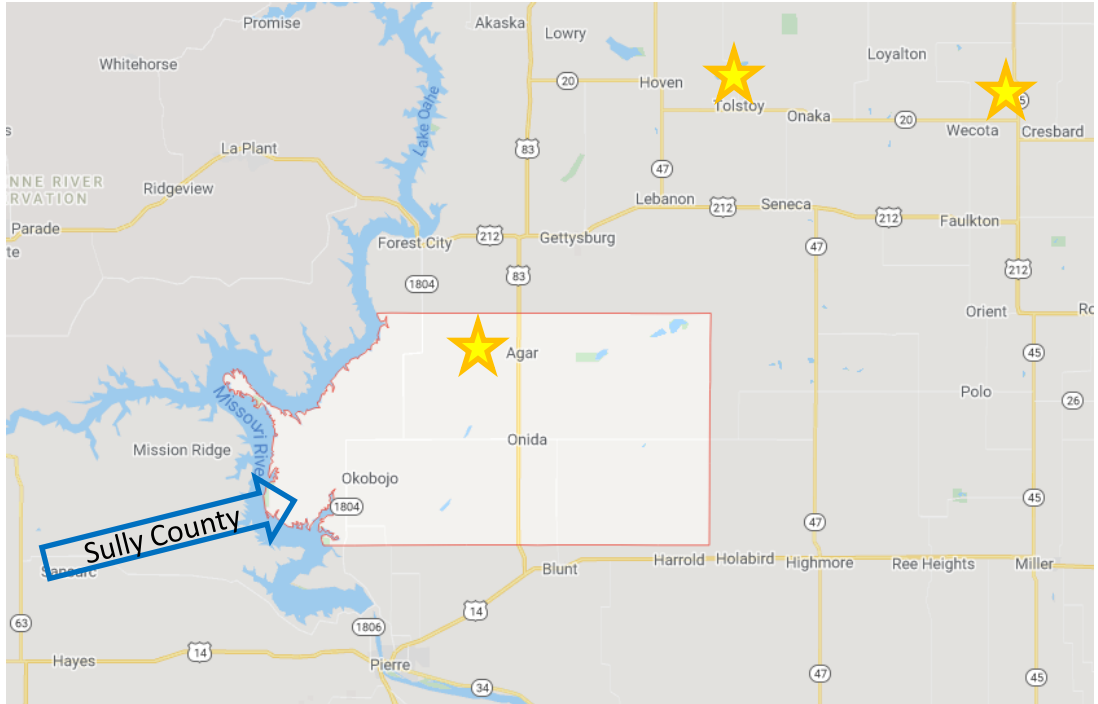

There were many trees on the place, wild fruit trees and tame fruit trees which were planted from time to time. It was always a great pleasure to visit the Joachims to see their well kept farm, beautiful trees and gorgeous flowers. Their trees were the scene of many public and church picnics. Mr. and Mrs. Joachim moved to Gettysburg in 1949. Mr. Joachim still lives there.

Oscar Joachim and family live on the farm. In 1948 a spacious home was built. Trees have been planted east of the house making the yard an ideal place for outdoor living in the summer time. Last year a large new barn was built which adds very much to the beauty of the place. **Oscar is a member of the Agar School board.**

Chris Joachim and family came to Milford from **Delmont, South Dakota, in 1923**. He bought the old Bert Mosher farm. A large grove of trees was planted by Chris. It was the one grove that survived the drought and grasshoppers. **In 1934, the family moved to Tolstoy, South Dakota. Mrs. Joachim lives at Cresbard, South Dakota. (per daughter Gertie & other sources the date moving to Tolstoy was 1936)** *Kim's Note: Milford Township is in Sully County*

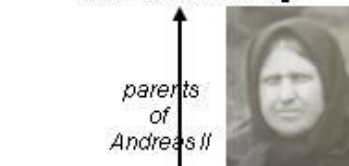

Funeral services for H. Victor Joachim, 64, Rural Route, Corona, were held Monday, July 22, 1985, at 10:30 a.m. at Central United Methodist Church with the Reverend DeVern Schwenn officiating. Interment was in the Milbank City Cemetery.

Mr. Joachim, who had been re-elected national president of the Dairy Herd Improvement Association at its annual convention March 10-14 in Phoenix, AZ, had left Sunday, July 14, after church for Minneapolis. He flew from there to Milwaukee, WI, for a meeting of the National D.H.I.A. On Wednesday, July 17, he flew from Milwaukee to Minneapolis and was driving back home when he was tragically killed in a one car accident about 10:30 p.m. in Big Stone County, Minnesota, approximately ten miles east of Ortonville.

Honorary pallbearers were Marlyn Lindahl, Henry Van Sambek, Robert Dahlberg, Floyd Dallie, Leonard DeBoer, Dick DeBoer, Walter Aschwege and Gerald Bowers.

Active pallbearers were E. Paul Willingham, Richard Sechrist, Richard Popp, Myers Owens, Harlan Bohn, W. Charles McGinnis, Michael Ramsey and Arvid Stengel.

Music for the service was provided by organist Mrs. Linda Stengel, pianist Mrs. Bette Willingham, a duet by David DeBoer and August Peterson, and a quartet: Marwood Wise, Leonard, James and Jack Stengel.

Military rites were conducted by the Birch-Miller Post No. 9, American Legion; The Grant County Post No. 3486, Veterans of Foreign Wars and the Milbank No. 19, Disabled American Veterans.

H. Victor Joachim was born Sept.

28, 1920 in Delmont, SD to Christian and Beata (Bauer) Joachim. He attended school in Agar, SD and graduated from high school there in 1938. He worked on farms for two years including Brookside Acres, Marietta, MN. He attended Northern State Teachers College, Aberdeen, from 1940-41. He worked as a bookkeeper at Brown County Implement (now John Deere) in Aberdeen. Mr. Joachim was a graduate of: Lasalle Higher Accounting, Chicago; Capitol Radio Engineering Institute, Washington, D.C.; Vocational Agriculture School; and the Graham School of Breeding, Kansas City, MO, in 1968.

He enlisted in the U.S. Navy on Jan. 7, 1942. In the Navy, he was a Turret Gunner plus Airborne Radar Operator Air-to-Air, with the rank of Aviation Radioman First Class (ARM1C). He served almost five years as Aviation Radioman First Class operating from carriers in the South Pacific. He was awarded the Asiatic Pacific Medal (3) Stars, the American Theatre Ribbon, the Good Conduct and World War II Victory Medals, the Air Crew Insignia (3) Stars and the Purple Heart. He was wounded while in the air over Rabaul, New Hebrides, in the South Pacific.

He was united in marriage to Shirley Herrick on Aug. 20, 1944 in the Methodist Episcopal Church, Milbank.

Following his honorable discharge from the U.S. Navy on Dec. 28, 1946, H. Victor and Shirley farmed one year at Cresbard, SD, five years on the old Herrick farm near Corona and then purchased the Fred Van Hoorn farm northwest of Milbank in 1952.

Mr. Joachim accepted the Lord Jesus Christ as his personal Savior in 1945 in San Diego, CA at the Salem Covenant Church and was baptized in the Christian Missionary Alliance Church, San Diego. He was an avid student of the Word of God and served as lay pastor for more than 30 years. He joined the First Baptist Church, Corona, in 1949 and later the First Baptist Church in Milbank in 1965. He was a member there at the time of his death. He served as a Sunday school teacher and deacon for many years.

Mr. Joachim was a member of Birch-Miller Post No. 9, American Legion and the Milbank No. 19, Disabled American Veterans, charter member of the Grant County Dairy Herd Improvement Association. Since 1952, he was a member of Roberts County DHIA. He served on South Dakota DHIA in various offices, then was elected as South Dakota's delegate to the National DHIA for 11 consecutive years. He was elected to the National DHIA Board of Directors,

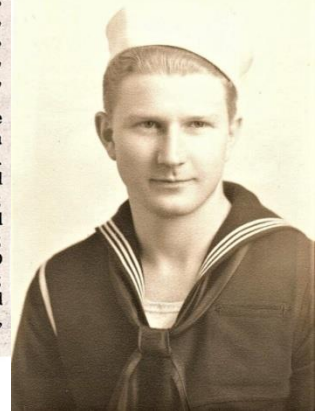

Wilhelm Adam Joachim Family History:

Paragraph about the Wilhelm Adam & Katharina Knorr Joachim family

This couple emigrated from Germany to Poland, perhaps around 1800-1804. It was a period of great economic distress and upheaval in their homeland, and many citizens were leaving Germany for other lands, including Poland. At that time this part of Poland belonged to Prussia. Better living conditions were sought. However, in Poland they became mostly tenant-farmers on large estates and it became a period of political unrest. Soon Russia made greater promises to all who would come and settle the steppes of Bessarabia. This region had just been wrested from the Turks by war and finalized at the Treaty of Bucharest in 1812. Bessarabia had been inhabited by nomadic tribesmen herding cattle, horses and sheep. These nomads held mostly insecure titles to the land. Russian nobility and military officers had been granted large tracts of land. At the beck of Czar Alexander I of Russia the first German Kolonies(dörfer) were founded in 1814. Friedenstal was founded in 1834 by 60 families coming from Poland, Prussia, Mecklenburg, Baden and Württemberg.

It is known that Wilhelm ADAM Joachim had five sons, three of whom migrated to Friedenstal, Bessarabia between 1835-1840. They were Andreas, Johann and Adam also known as George Adam, reasons being likely better economic opportunities.

- A-1 ADAM JOACHIM, also known as George Adam was born Feb. 6, 1819 in Konty, Poland (also referred to Conti, Konti or Konty). He died June 9, 1899 in Friedenstal, Bessarabia. He was confirmed 1833.

III. George Adam Joachim began farming in Friedenstal, Bessarabia, and came to U.S.A., Dakota territory with wife and children in 1876 along with brothers Jacob and Gottlieb. He, too, as brother Jacob became homesick and after one and one-half years in the states decided to return to his homeland, Friedenstal; however, the last moment changed his mind and chose to stay here while the others left. For six years they lived in Yankton doing common labor wherever it could be found. He made one journey on a Missouri river boat into Montana. Then he homesteaded five miles southwest of Tripp and farmed there until 1911 when they sold out and moved to the town of Delmont. He also had engaged in farming in Friedenstal before emigrating to the U.S.A. He was better known as Adam Joachim.

Shirley Robinson Herrick Joachim obituary

Shirley Joachim

Shirley Joachim, 93, longtime Corona area resident, died Sunday, January 11, 2015. Shirley and her late husband, Vic, were farmers in the Corona area and she was a former teacher.

Funeral services were Saturday, January 17, at Central United Methodist Church in Milbank. Burial was in the Milbank Cemetery.

Shirley Ione Robinson Herrick Joachim was born May 29, 1921, in Sioux Falls to Frank and Mary Etta Kickland Robinson. Her mother was blind from childhood. Her father left the family when Shirley was nine, which, at that time, also included Shirley's two brothers.

Her mother's sister helped take care of the children for awhile, but eventually they were put in the Children's Home Society, an orphanage in Sioux Falls.

When she was ten, Shirley was adopted by Charlie and Clara Herrick of Corona, who also had two sons, Merlyn and Arlo. The Herricks became her family, though she did maintain contact with her birth brothers and her mother.

Shirley attended country grade school at Kilborn #1 and attended Milbank High School, graduating in 1939.

She enrolled at Northern State Teachers College in Aberdeen and while standing in the registration line the first day met H. Victor Joachim, who later became her husband.

The couple married on August 20, 1944, in Milbank while Vic was recuperating from a leg injury sustained during World War II. Vic had enlisted in the Navy following the attack on Pearl Harbor in 1941.

Shirley obtained her teaching certificate and taught for several years in country schools in Grant County before her marriage. She lived with her parents or with families in the school district.

After marriage, the couple lived in San Diego, CA, where Vic was in the Naval Hospital. They later lived in Oakland, CA, where she worked for Western Union during the war and volunteered with the USO. Later they lived in Hawaii on the island of Maui until Vic was discharged from the Navy.

Following his discharge, the couple moved to Cresbard to help Vic's father on the family farm. About a

year later, they moved to Shirley's childhood farm near Corona where they rented from her parents. They farmed there for about four years until they bought the family farm that became Faith Acres, also by Corona, in 1952.

Shirley lived at Faith Acres until she entered the Good Samaritan Care Center in Clear Lake in December of 2011 after a brief hospitalization for newly diagnosed heart problems. She later transferred to Golden Living Center in Milbank.

Throughout her life, Shirley was a teacher. After they moved to Faith Acres, she taught country schools in Roberts County for several years.

After Shirley quit teaching school, she bought baby calves at the sale barns and raised them to sell as feeder cattle. She was an excellent calf raiser, almost never losing a calf. She often brought the calves home in the trunk of the old Oldsmobile car.

After her kids left home, she worked at Lucy's Fabric Shop in Milbank for several years. She was an excellent seamstress, making most of the clothing for her and her children when they were younger.

After Vic died in a car accident in 1985, Shirley milked the cows until she leased them several months later.

Eventually she started working as a certified nursing assistant at Beverly Care Center, now Golden Living, in Milbank. When Park Place opened she went to work there.

She took the medication aide course and started working as a UAP when she was about 75 years old. She worked there until she was 88. Shirley worked in that system for almost 20 years, retiring twice before the final time.

Shirley served as a 4-H leader, and was involved in a homemakers extension club. She was also a member of the Milbank Area Retired Teachers Association and the Whetstone Valley Art Club.

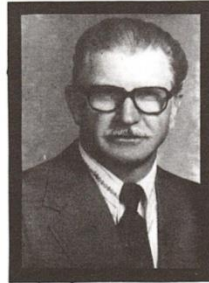
The Milbank DAV Auxiliary was organized in 1979 and Joachim served as commander of the Unit for the first two terms.

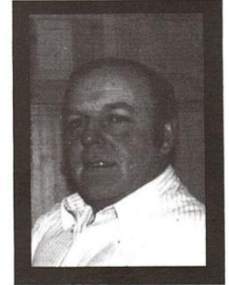

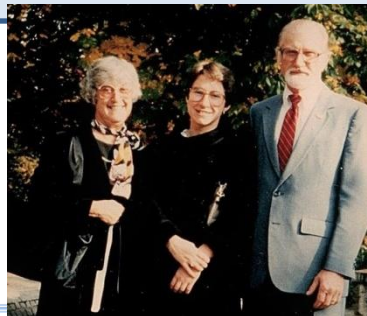
